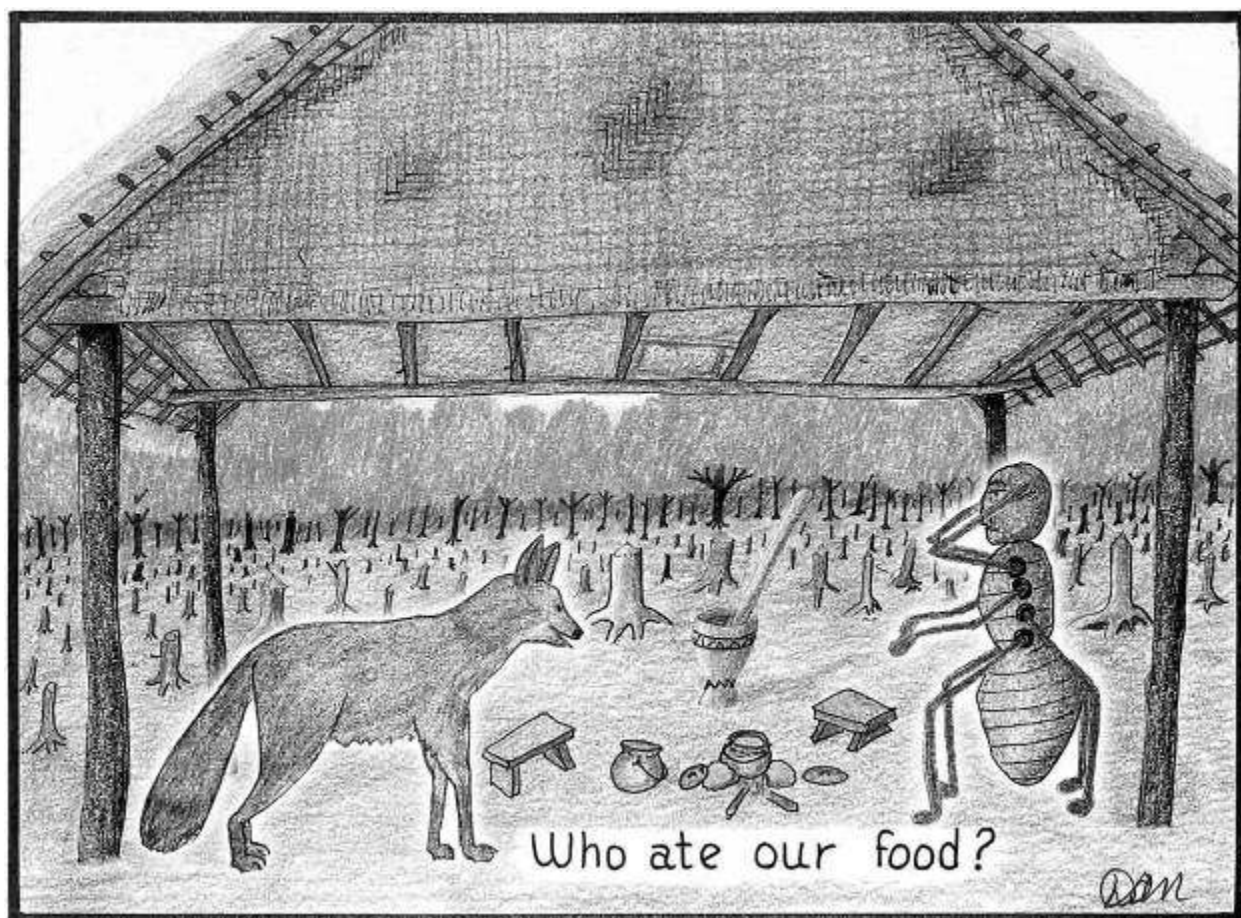
They went back to where they had cooked the food. The food was all gone. Only dirty pots remained.
